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

PASTOR'S MESSAGE

The season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, March 6th and ends on Easter Sunday, lasting for 46 days (40 days excluding Sundays). Lent is a solemn period of fasting, moderation, and self-denial traditionally observed by Christians. The purpose of Lent is the preparation of the believer for Easter through prayer, doing penance, mortifying the flesh, repentance of sins, almsgiving, and self-denial.

During Lent, many Christians commit to fasting, as well as giving up certain practices in order to replicate the sacrifice of Jesus Christ's journey into the desert for 40 days. Some Christians also add a Lenten spiritual discipline, such as reading a daily devotional or praying through a Lenten calendar.

Lent began as a way for Christians to remind themselves of the value of repentance. However, over the centuries many Christians started to believe that giving up something for Lent was a way to attain God's blessing. This is contrary to biblical teaching, which tells us that grace is the gift of God, which cannot be earned.

As we focus on repentance of our sins, how far we fall short, and self-denial, Lent is not often described as a time of joy. But recently I came across a book offering a new perspective on Lent, which I'll use for a Lenten sermon series. The book, by Max O. Vincent, is *Because of This I Rejoice: Reading Philippians During Lent*. Vincent writes: "Is Lent meant to be depressing? Are spiritual disciplines supposed to sound like the drudgery of chores? Is confession nothing more than taking out our spiritual trash, praying akin to writing out the grocery list? Am I wrong to look forward to Ash Wednesday? Am I sacrilegious in finding joy in Lent?"

Vincent points to Paul's Epistle to the Philippians, where the apostle uses the word "joy" more in this letter than in any of his others. Paul shares how he practices certain spiritual disciplines with great joy! What is the source of Paul's joy? The practice of these spiritual disciplines brings him closer to Christ and deepens their relationship.

Following Paul's example, our spiritual disciplines practiced during Lent are not meant to earn us "brownie points" with God, or make us spiritual giants in our church. They are meant to bring us closer to our Lord and Savior and transform us into His likeness. Shouldn't the thought of being more like Jesus bring us great joy? With this fresh perspective Lent becomes less about what we give up—and much more about what we gain!

I will be starting this sermon series the Sunday before Lent because we have a guest missionary preacher on March 24 (Jim Hill of Trans World Radio). Here is the schedule of messages based on this book:

March 3: Joyful Prayer (Philippians 1:1-11)

March 10: Joyful Witness (Philippians 1:12-26)

March 17: Joyful Humility (Philippians 1:27-2:18)

March 31: Joyful Hospitality (Philippians 2:19-30)

April 7: Joyful Asceticism (Philippians 3)

April 14: Joyful Giving (Philippians 4)

- The color originally associated with St. Patrick is blue, not green.
- The harp, not the shamrock, is the national symbol of Ireland.

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Faith Journey

A family was heading on vacation: two little ones were nestled in car seats; the van was packed. As Dad locked the house and Mom secured the garage, an adult neighbor the kids knew walked up and spoke through an open window. "Where are you going?" The kids shrugged. "Well, what road are you taking?" the friend asked with a knowing smile. Of course, they had no idea. "Do you know where you'll eat today, or where you'll spend the night?" Blank stares. Then the friend asked, "Who are you traveling with?" The children broke into grins and shouted, "Mommy and Daddy!"

On the journey of faith, we don't know precisely where we're headed or how all our needs will be met. But we know who we're traveling with: our loving God who is fully aware of the twists and turns ahead; the loving Parent who promises to care for us wherever we go.

To God You Shall Return

The traditional Ash Wednesday words "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return" might seem depressing. But in our often death-denying culture, some might find it refreshing to hear the frank statement that we can do nothing to save ourselves, physically or spiritually — that, no matter how we try to avoid sin, we can't untangle ourselves from self-interest. How liberating, then, to know we don't have to! God loves us as we are and sent Jesus to break sin's power over us.

A pastor described Ash Wednesday as the point you can pinch in the middle of a long piece of ribbon, such that when you lift it high, the two ends — one symbolizing our baptism and the other, our funeral — meet and touch. We come from dust and will return to dust, but we also come from God and will return to God. Ash Wednesday reminds us that we're always safe in God's love.

As Lent approaches I look forward to us growing deeper in our faith, closer to Christ—and doing so joyfully!
